



2018 has been an impactful year for Partners for Clean Streams. We had a record-breaking number of volunteers at many of our annual programs and collected the highest amount of marine debris during Clean Your Streams Day ever. As much as we would like to celebrate these accomplishments, we were reminded during our Annual General Meeting that there is still work to be done. One of our volunteers asked if we were finding less trash during our cleanups. The simple answer is no. Although the majority of the specific items we are removing from our waterways have changed in the last decade, the total amount has increased, but so have our efforts.

According to Collins Dictionary, "single-use" is the 2018 word of the year. This word has reached the global lexicon and we are dealing with the issue of single-use items locally in our streams, rivers, and Lake Erie. 76% of the items collected this year at Clean Your Streams Day were plastics. This number reflects international trends and has created public understanding that recycling efforts are not enough. We can all be part of the solution to tackling marine debris and specifically single-use items by refusing, reducing, and reusing. Our educational outreach and volunteer opportunities year-round give our community a hands-on understanding of the role and responsibility we all have to consider our impact on the environment.

We are grateful to our volunteers who showed us their dedication to improving local water quality this year. Even though we are asked hard questions with no easy answers, our totals throughout this Annual Report show that our community is willing to work for clean, clear, and safe water. We are especially grateful to our partners at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) who have provided funding for our marine debris removal efforts in Northwest Ohio for the next two years. 2018 has inspired us to be on the forefront of marine debris prevention and removal and to continue to engage our community to tackle this issue through new programs, partnerships, and places to cleanup. We hope you will also be inspired after reading our highlights of the year to be a Partner for Clean Streams. Together, let's change the picture and leave only footprints

3rd Annual Partnership with Mercy Health Glass City Marathon

PCS is the "Green Team" at the Mercy Health Glass City Marathon. We work with the marathon coordinators to improve sustainability behind the scenes and are there for the weekend to encourage individual recycling. Our efforts have continued to expand as we help the organizers and runners adopt our eco-friendly initiatives.

We worked with GCM behind the scenes to fulfill their goal of a "Green-Certified" marathon. GCM has adopted an internal policy to clearly define what materials are acceptable to their team members and business partners. Goals included:

- Eliminate Styrofoam and non-compostable materials
- Encourage recyclable packaging and service wares
- Continue to seek alternatives to single-use products and materials

All this was made possible by 17 volunteers, including BGSU students and Toledo ZooTeens stationed inside Lot 10 and Glass Bowl stadium.

Our Storm Drain Marking program supports proper maintenance of local storm drains through marking them with the slogan "Drains are for rain – flows to waterways" coupled with educational outreach to homeowners.



As a municipal stormwater educator, I've witnessed the remarkable value that comes from participating in community driven storm drain marking. Many citizens don't realize the water that enters our storm drains isn't treated before flowing into the Maumee River, and may not even realize these drains flow to the river at all. The storm drain marking program educates not only the people who pass by the markings or live in the marked neighborhoods, but also creates stormwater stewards of the volunteers who've mark these drains. This activity creates a sense of ownership and pride every time the volunteer passes the work they've done and makes them more likely to clear and protect other storm drains in the future. The more people we have in our community that care about what enters our water, the healthier our watershed will be. I believe participation in this program is invaluable for any storm sewer owning community. We are lucky to have Partners for Clean Streams in the City of Perrysburg, and I'd like to thank them for all of their help in educating our citizens and providing so many opportunities for community involvement.



Get the Lead Out is our cleanup program specifically focused on removing the fishing line, lead, and lures that get left behind after the spring walleye and white bass runs along the Maumee River. Volunteers remove fishing debris to prevent wildlife entanglement and enhance the aesthetics of our beautiful Maumee River. Fishing line can remain in the ecosystem for 600 years, so our efforts are vital to keep our rivers healthy.



MAAC Maumee Area Of Concern Advisory Committee (MAAC) Facilitating Organization

PCS is the local facilitating organization for the Area of Concern (AOC) and coordinates the MAAC. The MAAC works through partnerships and planning to find and develop fundable projects that lead to removing Beneficial Use Impairments (BUIs) within the Maumee Area of Concern; facilitate partnership-building and collaboration in watershed planning and project development; assist partners with implementations of projects; and raise awareness of AOC issues within the community. PCS specifically addresses BUI 11 (Degradation of Aesthetics) by leading small and large-scale cleanups to remove marine debris. In 2018, PCS facilitated three tours to showcase habitat restoration projects within the Maumee AOC that were fast-tracked for funding. MAAC members were invited on an Eastern AOC tour series, which highlighted ongoing projects at Howard Marsh, Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge, and Toussaint Wildlife Area. The tour series continued with a cruise on the Sandpiper featuring downtown Toledo habitat restoration projects. Additionally, a Western AOC tour focused on restoration projects in the Oak Openings region and Maumee State Forest. National Oceanic and Atmosphere Administration (NOAA) Marine Debris Program

PCS was one of only 12 grant recipients for the removal of marine debris and the only organization working in the Great Lakes Region. NOAA's grant will allow us to expand our cleanups in impact and scope. Through this grant, we will remove 30,000 pounds of marine debris from the Maumee River and other tributaries in the greater Toledo area over a two-year span. Our cleanups help prevent debris from entering and polluting western Lake Erie. We are very grateful to be able to increase our impact in the next two years!

Educational and Outreach Events

PCS had the opportunity to engage with and educate the public at 17 events in 2018. We shared about our mission and programs at several presentations. We were invited to several Earth Day events where we worked with partners to encourage citizens to do their part for the planet. Through education and outreach, we hope to further our impact and inspire more people to be part of the solution.
