### Kris 2023 reflection letter

As usual, we had a busy, busy year. In 2023 we continued to our stewardship programs, watershed planning, and our other programming, outreach, and education. Compared to 2022, 160 more volunteers joined us across all our programs. Through Storm Drain Marking, volunteers marked 816 more storm drains and distributed over 2,700 more door hangers than 2022. This is an incredible feat!

We also had a busy year supporting community projects and partnerships. We continued working with UT and TMACOG on the chlorides reduction strategy project and kicked off our first full year of coordinating volunteer water monitoring in Western Lake Erie basin with "Community Water Action in Toledo" with many partners (Cleveland Water Alliance, Metroparks Toledo, and the Toledo Zoo). 2023 was the first full sampling season and with additional funding, we plan to recruit more broadly for volunteers to continue monitoring in 2024. As we've done since our founding, we've proudly continued our leadership of the Maumee AOC Advisory Committee and its work.

The best part of Partners for Clean Streams has always been the people. It's those people that truly make up PARTNERS for clean streams. From the Board that so quietly works behind-the-scenes (and sometimes lead cleanups and outreach tables too) to the financial partners that consistently provide reliable funding and in kind support to the many, many volunteers - you are each PARTNERS for clean streams. Without you, the long planning meetings, many grant applications, and long days packing supplies wouldn't result in the huge impact in and near the rivers that we see every year.

2023 also marked the end of my leadership with Partners for Clean Streams. In early 2024, I began a new journey with the Lake Erie Commission, but I know our winding streams will cross again as I am not leaving the water world! A new Executive Director will join the PCS team in 2024, to help PCS continue our mission of clean, clear and safe water!

- Volunteers choose a time and location to remove marine debris throughout NW Ohio waterways all year long.
- Clean-ups can be PCS staff-led or clean-on-your-own. Participants track the items they remove as citizen scientists, by the Ocean Conservancy.







### Get the Lead Out Stats

- 5 clean-ups
- 34 volunteers
- 79 pounds of debris removed
- 3 river miles covered



- These staff-led marine debris clean-ups focus on fishing line, lures, hooks, and lead sinkers in the Maumee River.
- Programs are held throughout the summer when Maumee River water levels are lower in order to access shoreline where fishing debris gets tangled.
- Lures and lead sinkers can be mistaken for food by animals.
   Fishing debris removed during these programs reduces the risk of animal entanglement and injury.



## Storm Drain Marking Stats

- 118 volunteers
- 1,340 drains marked
- 4,024 educational door tags distributed
- Volunteers label storm drains with stenciled paint or medallions to prevent improper dumping and blocking drains.
- PCS supported 2 "Citizenship in the Community" BSA
   Scout merit badge days of service, and storm drain marking
   projects with Perrysburg High School students and with Tole do Service Learning Camps.







27th Annual Clean Your Streams Stats

- 70 sites cleaned
- 723 volunteers
- •14,957 pounds of debris removed
- 37 river miles covered



- On September 30th, Partners for Clean Streams hosted our largest program focused on marine debris removal, awareness, and education. Our volunteer numbers continued to rebound from 2020 interruptions, with 71 more volunteers in 2023 than 2022, and collecting 1,002.5 more pounds of marine debris.
- We continued the Remote Kickoff, started in 2020, during the week leading up to Clean Your Streams Day, where participants had the option to clean-on-their-own at a time and location of their choosing.

- Fishing line recycling bins encourage anglers to responsibly recreate along our rivers.
- Regional partners install fishing line recycling bins, including Metroparks Toledo, Wood County Park District, the City of Toledo, the City of Perrysburg, and others.
- Volunteers have the option to sponsor a bin and/or adopt a bin by agreeing to clean and maintain it.
- Thank you to our new and returning fishing line recycling bin sponsors!
- Total number of bins in use around Northwest Ohio: 45

- PCS and Keep Toledo/Lucas County Beautiful serve as sustainability advisors for the Mercy Health Glass City Marathon and the Savage 5k, focused on diverting waste from landfills, preventing marine debris from entering the Ottawa River, coordinating recycling and composting, and making more sustainable choices during purchasing.
- We had an amazing group of volunteers this year from the University of Toledo, Sea Cadets, and Partners for Clean Streams Board.
- Keep Toledo/Lucas County Beautiful will take the lead on overseeing the Green Team in future years.

## New Stewardship δ Education Program

## Community Water Action in Toledo

- This multi-agency program focuses on streamlining volunteer water quality monitoring in western Lake Erie. Participating organizations share equipment, training resources, and align sampling protocols.
- Facilitated by PCS, other local partners include Metroparks
   Toledo, TMACOG, and the Toledo Zoo. Cleveland Water Alliance
   has provided local partners with sampling equipment and
   guidance. CWAT is Northwest Ohio's hub for a Lake Erie
   region-wide effort of the Lake Erie Volunteer Science Network,
   led by Cleveland Water Alliance.
- CWAT created six shared sampling kits, identified waterway sites to sample, engaged partner organizations' volunteers and staff in monitoring 18 local sites, sampled each site at least once a month, and shared data in the online Water Reporter database.
- CWAT engaged more than 60 volunteers in over 100 sampling events, with additional outreach programs demoing CWAT to local youth in Girl Scouts and Connections Camp participants.
- Watch for more opportunities to get involved in 2024!

### Public Education Outreach

- PCS shared education around marine debris, water quality, sustainable water use, and shared updates and events from our many community partners on social media throughout the year



## Maumee Area of Concern Facilitating Organization

- Since 2007, PCS has been designated by the state as the local facilitating organization for the Maumee Area of Concern (AOC) and coordinates the Maumee Area of Concern Advisory Committee (MAAC).
- In short, an AOC is a place that has experienced environmental harm, as designated by the International Joint Commission, and where many agencies and local partners are stepping in to help!





- "BUI 11 Degradation of Aesthetics" was removed from the Maumee AOC in 2023. This brings the Maumee AOC's beneficial use impairments (BUIs) down to 7 of the original 10 BUIs.

We are proud to continue prudently managing resources, successfully funding our programs and projects through both long-standing grant support and new grants in 2023, including support of the Sisters of St. Francis Donor Advised Fund, and the Greater Toledo Community Foundation's grant funding for Community Water Action in Toledo. As of September 30th, PCS had \$66,269 in cash balances. PCS is also the fiscal agent for the Maumee RAP Supplemental Environmental Project restricted fund that has \$18,382.

Using in-kind resources, we lower our expenses so that individual donations and sponsorships stretch even farther. We continue to secure multi-year and single-year grants and to diversify our funding through donations, sponsorships, and building relationships with other organizations.


